



An open source license gives others the permission to build upon your work.

Everything you write,  
and everything you draw,  
is automatically,  
by default:

© ALL RIGHTS RESERVED, YOU

It can't legally be remixed.

So to make your work "fertile" you need to apply an open source or 'free culture' license. This isn't just a legal tool, it's a social one.

It indicates to others that you encourage them to use your work.

We're using the Creative Commons Attribution-ShareAlike license:



This is the same license that Wikipedia uses. It gives people the right to use your work under the following terms:

① Attribution – You must give appropriate credit, provide a link to the license, and indicate if changes were made. You may do so in any reasonable manner, but not in any way that suggests the licensor endorses you or your use.

② ShareAlike – If you remix, transform, or build upon the material, you must distribute your contributions under the same license as the original.

No additional restrictions – You may not apply legal terms or technological measures that legally restrict others from doing anything the license permits.

If you prefer (and if you're not building upon other CC-BY-SA work) you can instead choose to use the CC-BY license (which doesn't require others to ShareAlike) or the CC0 copyright waiver which puts
